John is a bowhunter and gun hunter who has been tracking wounded deer for 34 years. In his professional life he taught history at Hofstra University, but he is retired now. Teaching history was one of his passions; the others were hunting and finding ways to reduce the loss of wounded big game. In 1976 he received a research permit from New York State's Department of Environmental Conservation to investigate the feasibility of using leashed tracking dogs when deer and bear could not be found by other means. The success of this research project led to the legalization of tracking dogs in his own state and subsequently in many others. As a hunter he has published numerous articles and a widely selling book, *Tracking Dogs for Finding Wounded Deer*. He has given numerous workshops, seminars and presentations on wounded deer tracking. Every year John tracks wounded deer and bear for local hunters and takes over 30 "deer and bear calls".

John resides with his wife Jolanta in Berne, located in the Helderberg Mountains of New York State, where they breed wire-haired dachshunds for blood tracking and hunting. 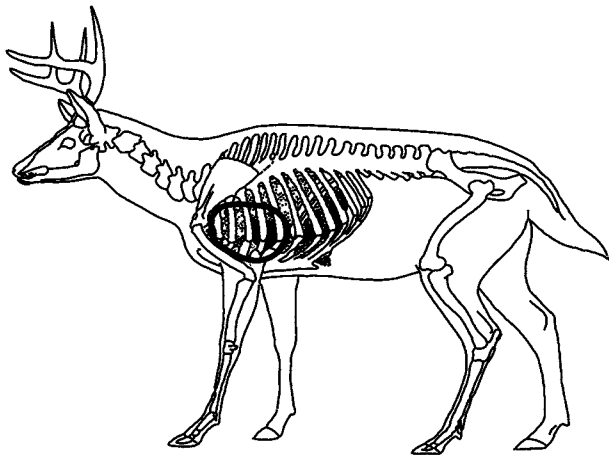
